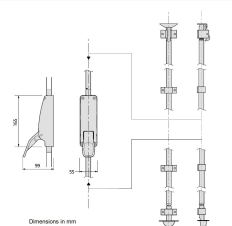

Product Description

The Briton 372E Push Pad Vertical Bolt is a high-quality emergency exit device designed to facilitate quick and safe egress from a building. Suitable for single doors and non-rebated double doors, this surface-mounted vertical bolt is operated by a simple push pad. When the pad is depressed, the top and bottom bolts disengage immediately, allowing the door to open.

To protect against external tampering, the unit features an integrated anti-thrust device that prevents unauthorised retraction of the latch bolts. It is fully reversible, making it suitable for both left and right-handed doors, and features adjustable top and bottom shoots to ensure a precise fit during installation.

Certified to BS EN 179, the Briton 372E is ideal for commercial and public buildings where personnel are familiar with the escape routes. It is finished in a durable silver enamelled coating and comes with a 5-year manufacturer's guarantee.

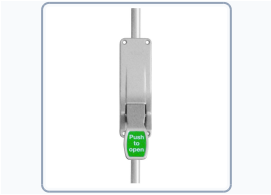

- **Overhead door closers** (including their long-running “classic” closer heritage)
- **Panic and emergency exit devices** such as push bars and push pads, designed and tested to standards like **EN 1125** (panic) and **EN 179** (emergency exit) depending on application
- A broader ecosystem that now extends into related **locks, cylinders, door furniture and accessories** under the Briton hallmark
