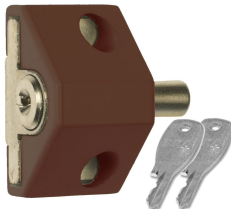

Brand Profile

ERA



ERA (often seen as **ERA Home Security**) is one of the long-standing names in UK locking and hardware, rooted in the **West Midlands** and heavily tied to the **door & window** trade. ERA traces its origins to **1838**, when **John Reynolds** started a locksmith business in **Willenhall**—a town that’s basically the spiritual capital of British lockmaking.

These days ERA positions itself as a “home security expert” that **designs, develops, manufactures, and distributes** a broad range of products for the residential building and home improvement market—spanning **cylinders and door hardware, window hardware, smart/security products**, and associated ironmongery ranges (including brands like **Crompton** under the ERA umbrella).

On the corporate side, ERA was historically part of **Tyman plc** (you’ll see that referenced in older deal/industry material). More recently, ERA states directly that it is **now part of Quanex** (NYSE: NX) following Quanex’s acquisition of Tyman.
